














Are you are interested in an exciting, in-depth boating knowledge course, check out *America's Boating Course*.

Bremerton Sail and Power Squadron (ABC Bremerton) will be presenting this course via Zoom on February 18 and 19, 2023. The class will start at 0900 and end around 1700. The second day will be a review of the material and then a test will be given. Upon passing this test you will be eligible to submit an application, along with a copy of the course completion certificate and \$10.00 to the State of Washington. They in turn will mail your Washington State Boaters Card to you. This card is non expiring and is in accordance with Washington State Law required of all individuals operating a vessel born after April 1, 1955.

America's Boating Course is recognized by the <u>U.S. Coast Guard</u> and has been approved by the <u>National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA)</u>

#### Ecology of the Salish Sea

#### Marine

The Salish Sea supports an active and dynamic marine ecosystem, dominated by species suited to the <a href="mailto:brackish">brackish</a>, nutrient-rich, conditions. As with all marine food webs, the Salish Sea features a range of <a href="mailto:trophic groups">trophic groups</a>, with <a href="mailto:autotrophic algae">autotrophic algae</a> acting as primary producers. The <a href="mailto:fluvial systems">fluvial systems</a> draining British Columbia and Washington introduce large volumes of sediment and dissolved nutrients into the Salish Sea.

#### Flora

#### Bull kelp washed ashore near Victoria

The Salish Sea hosts a diverse community of <u>kelp</u> species that provide large volumes of high-quality habitat in areas with hard, rocky <u>substrates</u>. The largest of these kelp species include <u>bull kelp</u> and <u>giant kelp</u>.

<u>Eelgrass meadows</u> are abundant throughout the shallower regions of the sea.



#### Fauna

The Salish Sea is home to <u>253 fish species</u> contained within 78 families and 31 orders. These species encompass one <u>myxinid</u>, two <u>petromyzontids</u>, 18 <u>chondrichthyans</u>, two <u>chondrosteans</u>, and 230 <u>teleosts</u>.







In addition, the sea hosts 37 marine mammal species, most notably <u>Steller sea lions</u>, <u>humpback whales</u>, and <u>killer whales</u> (orcas). While mammal-eating <u>transient orcas</u> are gradually increasing in population, fish-eating <u>southern resident orcas</u> have struggled to survive due to low salmon populations. In 2019, this orca population was at a 35-year low after three adult deaths and no surviving calves over three years, leaving only 73 whales in the community. In 2021, an upsurge may occur in the humpback whale population with a record 21 humpback calves spotted in Salish waters.

Sea otters have been increasingly observed within the Strait of Juan de Fuca.

#### Sponge reefs

The mineral-rich waters of the Salish Sea are an ideal habitat for the formation of <u>glass sponge reefs</u>. These reefs were believed to have gone extinct during or shortly after the <u>Cretaceous period</u>, until a large collection of existing reefs were <u>discovered</u> off the <u>British Columbia Coast</u> in 1987. Due to their scientific and ecological importance, all known sponge reefs in the Salish Sea are protected from bottom-contact fishing activities. [42]
